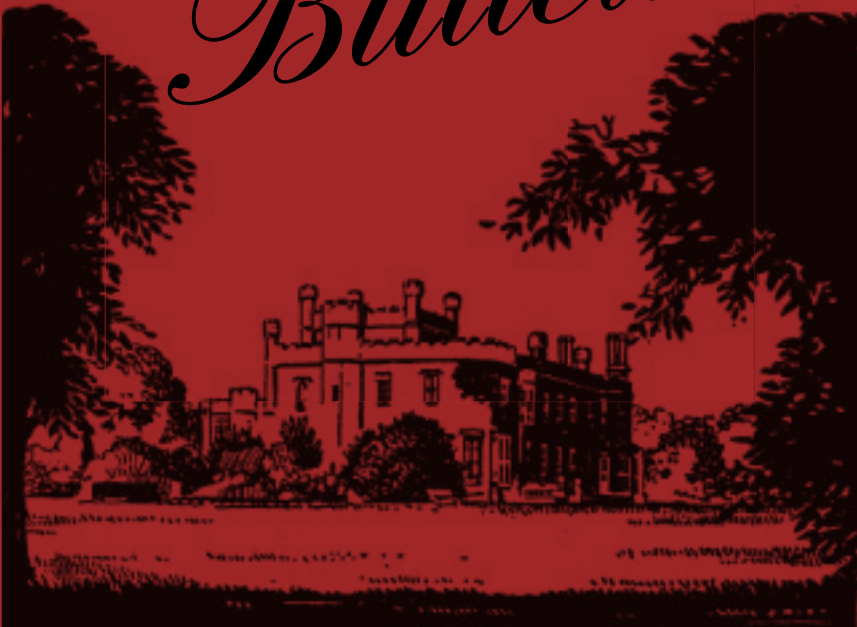

ALLOTMENTS

Many are sorry they have not an allotment, especially now that potatoes are rationed. It is not generally known that there are several allotments to rent at the rear of Holmwood Road in Westcott Way, also in Nonsuch Park. These can be had rent free until March next and then the rent is only a few shillings per annum. Those interested should apply to Borough Engineer, Town Hall, The Parade, Epsom.

BASIC PETROL

The Automobile Association and the Royal Automobile Club are pressing for an immediate restoration of half the basic ration to be used within a prescribed radius. Our new M.P., Mr. Malcolm McCorquodale, has promised to support the effort. It would be something to look forward to if these efforts were successful in obtaining a date from the Minister of Fuel, when the basic, or even half of it, would be restored.

SALVAGE

We would like to emphasise the appeal made recently **SAVE WASTE PAPER**. Please keep it dry and hand it to the Salvage Collector.

The Government have recently had to cut supplies of paper for Medical Supplies, a step which has never before been taken. Furthermore, we are now importing waste paper to meet the export need for packing cases, etc. These steps alone show how serious the position is and it is hoped all will co-operate in the **SAVE WASTE PAPER DRIVE**.

EXTRACT FROM DECEMBER 1947

May we address a special appeal to all dog owners in the neighbourhood to restrain their pets from fouling the public footpath. Recently a local resident was convicted by the Magistrates for permitting this offence and was fined £1.

It is hoped that none of our readers were too greatly inconvenienced by the Railway Strike and that no ill effects are now felt.

EXTRACT FROM JULY 1955

It is interesting to note that all possible efforts are being made to preserve the Green Belt and readers will no doubt remember that recently a statement was made in the House of Commons, drawing attention to the importance of checking the unrestricted sprawl of the built-up areas and of safeguarding the surrounding countryside against further encroachment. From information received, the Minister's view is well before the appropriate Committee of the Council of this Borough, from which it may be understood that further effort will be made to preserve the amenities of this particular area.

News from the Borough

Bourne Hall Kitchen

Refurbishment is taking place with completion by the end of March ready for the new financial year. The cost is slightly under budget at around £80k, giving the venue an opportunity to maximise its revenue potential and the catering flexibilities from April should allow for many more bookings.

Ewell Court House

Has performed well with projected year end revenue of £75,000.

Epsom Playhouse Panto

Has exceeded sales projections and net ticket sales were over 10% up against last year.

Sports Award Event

There was borough success at the annual Surrey Sports Award event on 6 December held in Woking. Ebbisham Sports Club winning 'Sports Club of the Year' and Sutton & Epsom Ladies Rugby Club winning 'Team of the Year'.

Sub National Transport Body for the South East(TfSE).

The proposal is that the body would give a greater say to local decision makers about the strategic growth of their area's infrastructure and economy. Continued economic success in the South East is threatened by intense pressure on transport networks. Investment is vital, not only to maintain the existing infrastructure, but also to develop new infrastructure which will help unlock the further growth potential in the area.

TfSE would speak with a single voice and develop a single integrated transport strategy for the South East. The seven councils involved are: Brighton & Hove, East Sussex, Hampshire, Kent, Medway, Surrey and West Sussex, with invitations to join made to: the Isle of Wight, Portsmouth and Southampton councils. Four Local Enterprise Partnerships: Coast to Capital, Enterprise M3, Solent and South East are expected to join. Each local authority will put the proposal in shadow form to their elected members and if approved could begin full operation from 2018/19.

Recruitment of a new Chief Executive for Epsom and Ewell

Councillor Chris Frost has been asked to join a group of five councillors which is charged with recruiting the new Chief Executive.

Cuts to funding of the Surrey Wildlife Trust

Surrey County Council plans to cut funding under its 50-year agreement with the Surrey Wildlife Trust to zero by 2021. This will result in all the Trust's 16 ranger jobs becoming redundant in April 2017. Few of these very experienced and dedicated staff are going to be re engaged in the much smaller organisation that will then exist. The loss of experience and capacity may well be detrimental to Surrey's countryside - the likelihood is that footpaths and bridleways will not be properly maintained; woodlands, downlands and heaths will increasingly be taken over by scrub and invasive plants, and sensitive habitats - heaths, chalk downland and coppiced woodlands (homes to nationally rare and threatened species such as the dormouse) will be lost.

It has been suggested that if we care about and enjoy the places that make Surrey special, these funding cuts should be reversed. The funding to avoid these job losses is less than 15p per head of population. Our Surrey County Councillor - John Beckett

In May 2009 I was elected for the very first time as your Residents' Association County Councillor, covering the Ewell Division, which consists of Stoneleigh, Ewell and Nonsuch wards. Being an active Borough Councillor I wanted to expand my understanding of local Government and wanted to make a difference to the residents I represented as most of the concerns residents raised with me were generally under the remit of Surrey County Council.

I have lived in Ewell since 1995 and I am fully aware of the ongoing pressures on the public road network as well as the local issues that are important to residents. I will always come back to residents whether via telephone, email or by personal contact including locally run surgeries. Many of you have contacted me concerned about potholes, misaligned kerbstones damaged grass verges or footway trip hazards and parking restrictions which seem to be the biggest number of issues raised by local residents.

I have been very active over the past 4 years improving many local roads including Cheam Road, Northey Avenue, Elm Road, Hampton Grove, Park Avenue East, Waverley Road, Ewell Park Way, Briarwood Road, Glenwood Road, and many more that have been surface dressed.

I have also helped residents of the division that have been prone to flooding such as Northey Avenue, Chessington Road, Beaufort Way and Ewell High Street, Beverly Close, Banstead Road, and Ox Alley's footways were resurfaced as a result of action and continued pressure by me on Surrey Highways.

I have actively worked with resident groups throughout the division, who's local roads have become car parks due to school or commuter parking and successfully introduced parking restrictions to address these issues.

I am always available to residents for advice, support and I have helped residents with other issues such as school places as well as adult and child social care cases.

I have also been active in my criticism of the wasteful spending of millions of pounds at SCC and especially the 60% rise the Conservative's awarded themselves in allowances.

I also support our local business and campaigned for and financed the introduction of the Christmas lights both on Stoneleigh Parade and Ewell Village to support Lights on Broadway and Ewell Yule as well as supporting the locally run Trifest.

Outside of the Council I sit on the board of the Meadow Primary School Children's Centre Local Advisory Board and was a key campaigner in getting SCC to reverse its decision to close the centre.

Chairman's Comments

Since becoming involved with the Residents' Association I have worked with John and witnessed his dedication to the local area and know how hard he works on behalf of all residents in the ward.

The feedback I get and my view from what I have witnessed is that John has done a great job since he was elected as our County Councillor at the last election in 2013 and is fully supported by the local Residents' Associations.

He has helped me considerably to get up to speed with local issues and to know who to contact regarding matters arising, especially since I became Chairman last year. Frequently the person to contact and to take the issue forward is John himself!

I would also mention that John would not be able to perform his role of County Councillor without the huge amount of support he receives from his family.

News from Surrey County Council (SCC)

1) Council Tax Rise

In January the Conservative leadership at SCC announced that they would increase their portion of the council tax by **14.99%**. Although SCC's grant settlement from the Government had been very poor, the fact that Surrey residents were to pay heavily to resolve the funding crisis was seen by most people to be unfair and unacceptable.

In the end, and at a chaotic Budget meeting in February which was delayed three times whilst the Leader of the Council sorted out what he wanted to say, the Conservatives backed down and went instead for a council tax increase of **4.99%**. It was a council tax rise and a budget which could have been prepared and announced much earlier. Instead what we now have is a rushed proposal, with no detailed plans.

Resident Association County Councillors did not vote to endorse the increase because the details of where cuts and service changes will take place will not be decided and announced by the Cabinet until late March, some seven weeks after the increase was agreed. That is not an open and transparent way to manage and spend public money.

Why the Conservatives changed their mind is a matter of debate. All indications were that a referendum, which would have been required to endorse the 14.99%, would have been expensive and produce a NO vote. One theory in the national press was that the Government, late in the day, promised SCC some additional funding in the future. However that behind the scenes "deal" had been talked about for some time, and the fact is, there is no additional money from the Government to support the Council's services in 2017/2018.

Ever since I have been a County Councillor, Residents' Association Councillors have challenged financial inefficiencies and waste at SCC, not least at budget time, but year after year the majority group have rejected the savings proposals we have made. For example cutting the cost of agency staff; reviewing the management structure of the council to save the costs of some of the high salary posts; ending the waste of empty council care beds costing over £1.5 million a year; and of course two years ago the Conservatives raised their allowances by over 60%. We can only hope that following this year's chaotic budget setting process SCC will start to make some serious inroads into tackling the inefficiencies and wasteful spending that still remain.

2) Street Lights Switched off for Part of the Night

SCC's plans to introduce part night lighting across Epsom and Ewell, with street lights being turned off between midnight and 5am in the vast majority of our residential roads, was due to be introduced on 1st January and a list of roads was posted on the SCC website in December. However the plans were postponed until 2nd February because SCC had not completed their site assessments nor concluded their meetings with Surrey Police and the Council's Road Safety teams.

Many residents had expressed concerns about the decision to darken our streets at night and, whilst welcoming the delay, this late change indicates a somewhat rushed and haphazard approach to the plans. As your County Councillors we were also concerned that SCC had not consulted Epsom and Ewell Borough Council about the switch-off, not least because there is concern about possible anti-social behaviour in and around the Borough's parks.

We understand the switch off has now begun.

It would appear that this Estate has had more than its fair share of Burglaries in recent months. Holmwood Road seems to be the favourite although there are many others.

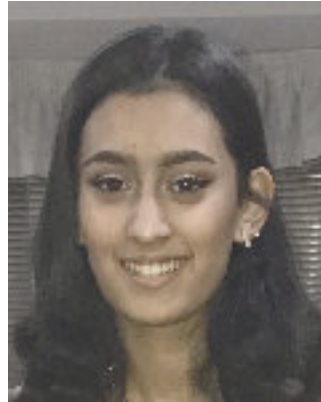
One wonders if the men seen frequently on the disused farm at the Railway Arch may have some connection as they have usually disappeared after a house has been broken into.

Why I joined Rotary? - by Margaret Martin

I run my own Human Resources Consultancy so time is precious. Nearly 10 years ago I was at a Princes Trust function and met up again with a friend, Primrose. We had sung together in the IBM choir and both of us moved to the Epsom area from Chiswick. Primrose and her husband Tom had joined Rotary and asked if I would like to come to a meeting at Cuddington Golf Club, which I did. I had viewed Rotary as boring business men regularly meeting for a just a meal, how wrong was I.

It was a fun evening, great speaker, great bunch of fun people - and women can become Rotarians as well! I had always given to charity but now there was a group of people who were fun to be with and we could make more of an impact by doing practical and fund raising projects together. The flexibility of attending the evenings meetings, or not, was a bonus as other members were still working or had young families.

Rotary is a world wide organisation with 1.2 m members so we can make a great difference to people's lives. Our Rotary International Fund Raising group have teamed up with the Bill Gates Foundation and aim to rid the world of Polio and for the last 30 years have nearly achieved this, we have gone from 120 to only 2 countries; Afghanistan and Pakistan. We eradicated polio last year from India, a major achievement.

Locally we put in a new kitchen for Riding for the Disabled Epsom, worked with Age Concern and currently are raising funds for local and international organisations. Every year the Epsom and Ewell Rotary Clubs come together to run the Fun Day at the Hook Road Arena with about 10,000 people attending. We have 140 stall holders from charities and commercial organisations, an area programme, food court and fun fair.

Rotary in Ewell have fund raising and fun events this year: We had a Valentines Dinner Dance raising money for Canine Partners training dogs to support disabled people at home. We have a cheese and wine party on 26 February a trip to the theatre in the West End in March, a visit from our twinned Rotary Club in France in April, a trip to a P&O ship in June, BBQ in August, Fun Day on 17 September and a fund raising quiz on 2 December at Ruxley Lane Church Hall, Ewell.

So you can see why I joined Rotary, I have been a member for 10 years this April, they have become another family to me, support great causes and help the local and international communities. If you would like to help at any events come and join in the fun.
